

Trauma and Injury Intelligence Group Biannual Bulletin

Alder Hey Childrens Hospital Emergency Department October 2014 to September 2015

December 2015




Figure 1: Gender of injury attendances by month, October 2014 to September 2015




Figure 2: Age group of injury attendances by month, October 2014 to September 2015

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This bulletin provides a breakdown of injury attendances to Alder Hey Children's Hospital Emergency Department (ED) between October 2014 and September 2015. Between October 2014 and September 2015 there were 17,205 ED injury attendances. The peak month for injury attendance, calculated as a daily average, was July 2015 (63 per day), with December 2014 (29 per day) accounting for the fewest. During this period there were more male (55%) injury attendances than female presenting at Alder Hey ED; patients aged five and under accounted for 33% of injury attendances, followed by patients aged 10 to 14 years (32%; figures 1 and 2).

The majority (97%) of injury attendances between October 2014 and September 2015 were recorded as other injuries. This includes incidents such as a body injuries and lacerations (table 1).

Table 2 displays the incident location where other injuries occurred. Over one third of other injuries occurred in 'other' locations (38%), 35% occurred in the home, 16% occurred in education establishments and 10% occurred in a public place.

¹ Please note that in all tables all numbers less than five have been suppressed (***) in line with patient confidentiality and if there is only one number less than five in a category then two numbers will be suppressed at the next level (e.g. <6) in order to prevent back calculations from totals.

² Other injury includes: Trauma – Accidental, Maxillary/Facial, Ingestion – Accidental and Bite/Sting.

Table 3 shows the discharge method of injury attendances. Just under two thirds (65%) of all injury attendances were discharged, 12% were discharged as 'other', 10% were referred to a fracture clinic, and 5% were referred to a GP.

ASSAULT ATTENDANCES

Between October 2014 and September 2015 there were 99 assault attendances to Alder Hey Children's Hospital ED. The month with the largest number of presentations was January (n=14); the majority of assaults attendees were male (77%); and 46% were aged between 10 and 14 years. Thirty-eight per cent of assaults occurred in a public place.
